MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



The Idaho Commission on Hispanic Affairs works closely with state agencies, community-based organizations, businesses, educational institutions, and volunteers to serve Idaho's growing Hispanic population. The latest results from the 6th Editon of the Hispanic Profile Data Book tells the story of the community. The statistics below highlight both success and opportunity:

- 13% of Hispanics represent the state population and workforce, accounting for:
 - 22% of Idaho's population growth (2010-2020).
 - 87% of Idaho's growth in employment (2009-2021).
- 83% of Idaho Hispanics are U.S. citizens.
 - 81% are of Mexican descent.
- 50% increase of Hispanic median household income over the past 15 years.
 - 20% of Hispanics are without health insurance or disproportionally under insured.
- 19% of K-12 public school students are Hispanic school-aged children.
 - 71% of K-12 enrollment growth (2014-2020).

The Strategic Plan sets us on a path to deliver our mission and vision for Idaho. We are well positioned to positively serve and measure education attainment, increase workforce and income opportunity, improve access to healthcare, and leverage strategic partnerships.

The work of the Commission is critical to ensure a healthy and competitive Idaho workforce, a strong economy, and a productive and informed citizenry. We thank you for taking the time to learn more about the resources and transformative approaches the Commission will undertake to deliver its purpose.

KEY SUCCESS FACTORS

A focused, step-by-step approach is necessary for the Idaho Commission on Hispanic Affairs (Commission) to effect meaningful, impactful changes over the short, medium, and long term. This plan, a constantly evolving and malleable working document, creates clear, specific objectives, and subsequent strategies to be implemented across the state. The Commission has identified the following as key success factors to advancing our purpose:

- Building cooperation and partnership between Idaho's Government and Hispanic Population—by partnering with the Governor, Legislature, and state agencies, we can provide resources, information, and strategic ideas that positively impact both audiences.
- **Improving institutional practices**—by partnering with state agencies, reviewing policies, practices, and procedures, and serving as a trusted partner, we can develop recommendations that will drive improved delivery of state services and resources.
- **Planning strategically**—by developing and maintaining a strategic plan that sets goals and defines solutions to directly impact and address opportunities for collaboration with Idaho Government and Hispanics. The strategic plan will be the roadmap to guide the Commission as it identifies future initiatives and goals.
- Identifying areas of opportunity through public policy analysis and data-driven research—by partnering to create awareness of opportunities and establish partnerships that result in positive changes in education, healthcare, government, and business.
- **Promoting accountability**—by valuing transparent decision-making and action, communicating those effectively and promoting investment in positive relationships with partners at all levels of government.
- **Enforcing professionalism**—by maintaining commitments and adhering to high standards of conduct, presentation, customer service, and accountability.
- Collaborating with the community—by promoting community engagement and volunteerism as a way of enriching communities by celebrating shared values and culture.

STRATEGY

The Commission, by design, is staffed as an agency that leverages partnerships to achieve its purpose. This requires an extraordinary level of collaboration with other organizations across the state.

For almost four decades, the office has cultivated a track record of partnerships, community relationships, and commitment to move forward with the Governor and other community leaders around the state to serve Idaho and its Hispanic community in the following ways:

- Serve as an advisory body to the Governor and agencies within the Executive Department on issues relating to the Hispanic population of Idaho.
- Convene state agencies, school superintendents, teachers, community members, college representatives, and others to identify strategic partnerships.
- Inform on any proposed federal, state, or local legislation, regulations, policies, or programs that impact the Hispanic population of Idaho.
- Conduct outreach to Hispanic groups and communities in the state and communicate information to them concerning public and private programs.



FOCUS AREAS

The Strategic Plan supports the mission of the office and is consistent with the stated purpose of the agency in its enabling statute (Chapter 72, Title 67, Idaho Code).

The Commission has established five focus areas:

- Education
- Health Care
- Business and Economic Development
- Civic Engagement and Public Policy
- Management and Performance

The following pages include the goals and strategies that members of the Commission have identified to fulfill our mission. The work of achieving the stated goals necessitates strong and strategic statewide partnerships to best serve the interests of all Idahoans.

In addition to the state-provided resources, the office proactively collaborates and pursues other resources, grants, sponsorships, and private donations to develop and implement state and regional outreach programs.

TITLE 67 STATE GOVERNMENT AND STATE AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 72 COMMISSION ON HISPANIC AFFAIRS

67-7201. Commission created — Appointment of members. There is hereby created the Idaho Commission on Hispanic Affairs, hereafter referred to as the commission. The commission shall consist of nine (9) members, two (2) to be appointed by the president pro tempore of the senate from the members of the senate; two (2) to be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives from the members of the house; and five (5) public members to be selected from the Hispanic community who reside in and represent the various geographical areas of the state which contain a significant Hispanic population. The five (5) public members shall be appointed by the governor. Of the five (5) public members first to be appointed, two (2) shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year, two (2) shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years and one (1) shall be appointed for a term of three (3) years. The governor shall specify the term of each public member when making the initial appointments. All initial appointments shall commence on July 1, 1987. All subsequent terms shall be for three (3) years. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments and for the balance of the unexpired term.

Goal 1:

EDUCATION – Idaho's K-20 public educational system supports high achievement among Hispanic students.

The Commission acts as a consulting resource to existing programs in school districts to increase outreach to students and families within the Hispanic community. The Commission acts as a liaison between the Hispanic community and other state entities, striving to create relationships with school districts and communities to create a brighter future for Idaho's Hispanic youth.

The Commission communicates its mission and objectives across Idaho communities by hosting and supporting events to promote cooperation and a deeper understanding between Hispanic communities and others including the Legislative Reception, Opening Ceremony for Hispanic Heritage Month, etc. The data the Commission compiles provides reference points against which to measure the impact of state programs, policies, and legislation.

Goal 5:

MANAGEMENT AND PERFORMANCE – Adoption of the NIST Cybersecurity Framework and Implementation of CIS Critical Security Controls 1 – 5.

As a technology customer of the Office of Information Technology Services (ITS) in the Governor's Office, we are using the cybersecurity systems and technical expertise of ITS to fulfill requirements related to Executive Order 2017-02. Staff from ITS briefed the NIST Core Framework, CIS Controls 1-5, and their plan for adoption of the NIST Cybersecurity Framework. We participate in DHR and ITS administered cybersecurity training, as awareness is a critical component of an effective cybersecurity program. As briefed by ITS staff, implementation of CIS Controls 1-5 will be ITS's responsibility for the systems they operate and, as technological tools applied to the computer systems, are largely invisible to us as customers. ITS, working through the multi-agency Incident Response Task Force, has developed an Incident Response Program in support of our agency.
